

CHROMSONANTS

Pangram: "Pack my box with five dozen liquor jugs."

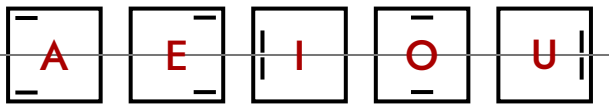
Each coloured square is a consonant.

Use the colour to find the column that the consonant belongs to in the table...

●	B	F	J/ch	M	Q	T/th	X
	C	G/gh	K/ck	N/ng	R	V	Y/ly
○	D/nd	H	L//l	P	S/sh	W	Z

...then check if the square has a white, black or empty fill to identify the row.

Some squares can also act as shorthands for common consonant combinations.

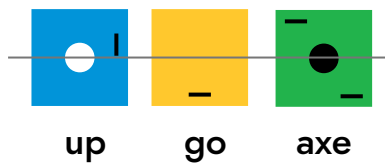


Each dash is a vowel.

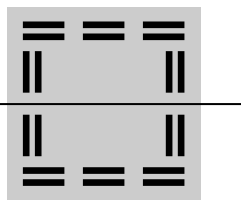
The position of the dash within a square determines which vowel it is.

For example:

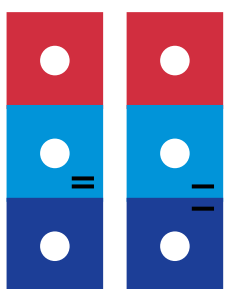
Dashes that lie above a square's midline are read before the consonant and dashes below are read after.



These are all the possible vowel positions. When a word has multiple consecutive vowels, dashes are stacked. Two stacks are shown here, but more can be added as needed, with dashes on the outside being read first.

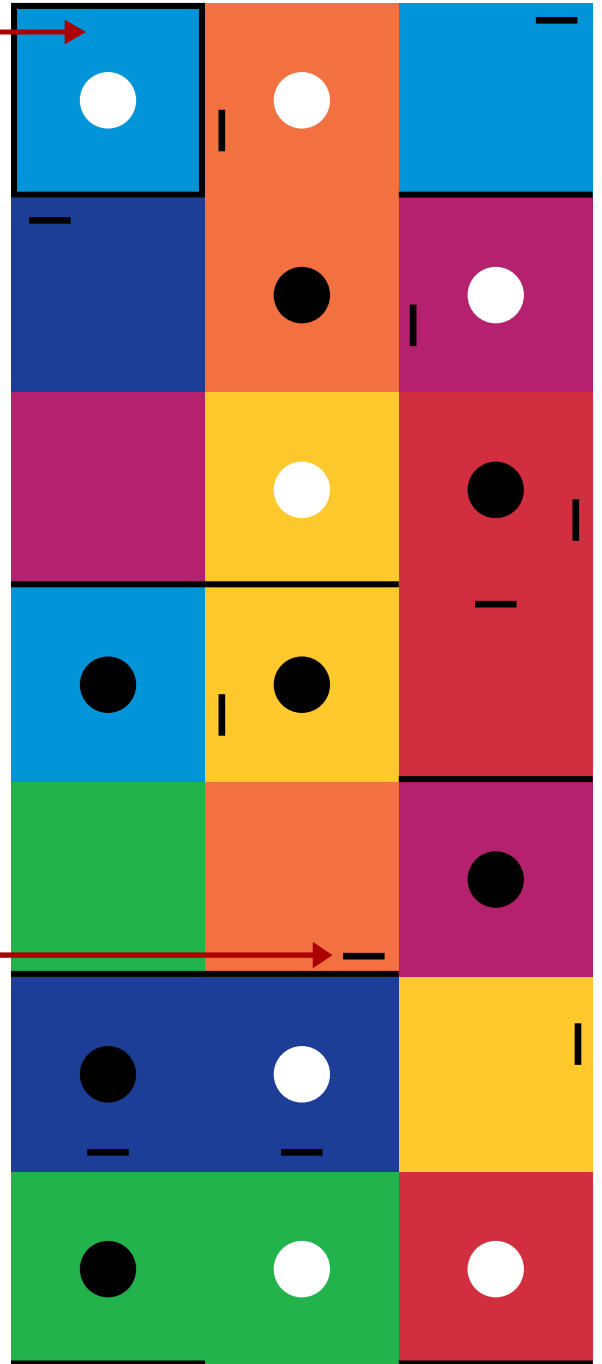
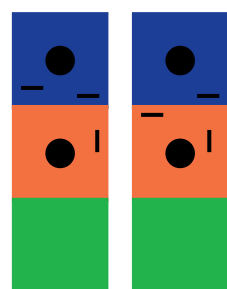

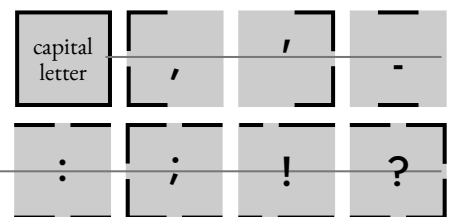


There are various ways to write some words, because the position of vowel dashes can be split across consonant squares.

beauty



Lines along edges act as word separators and punctuation:



Like a vowel, it can be placed above or below a square's midline (i.e. before or after words).
